When born, baby devils (joeys) are tiny - ABOUT THE SIZE OF A GRAIN OF RICE. ZZZZZZ Devils sleep underground during the day IN A DEN Females give



Devils are the largest living carnivorous marsupials in the world. Marsupial = an animal whose babies are carried in their pouch. Carnivore= an animal that eats mostly meat.



birth to around **30 BABIES** WITH THE LARGEST RECORDED LITTER HAVING OVER 50 BABIES! However, the female

only has four teats in her pouch, meaning only four babies will survive. IT IS SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST!

DEVILS CAN TRAVEL MORE THAN 20 KM

in one night searching for food- often using roads as they make travelling easier (WATCH OUT FOR WILDLIFE ON THE ROADS WHEN DRIVING!)

MAJOR THREATS

Devils are now listed as an **endangered species**, with **fewer than 15,000** left in the wild.

Devils are threatened by a very rare cancer, Devil Facial Tumour Disease.

Death on the roads due to car crashes are the second biggest killer of devils.



FIGHTING EXTINCTION



Zoos Victoria, through Healesville Sanctuary, is a partner of the Save the Tasmanian Devil program.

We aim to help breed and look after up to 50 Tasmanian Devils.



In 2013, 2015 and 2017, Tasmanian Devils were released from Healesville to locations free of the Devil Facial Tumour Disease in Tasmania. Zoos Victoria also assists with monitoring and conducting research in the wild, in the lab and in our zoos.
